President's Message: Become an Area Expert

Those of us who incorporate travel photography as part of our portfolio are often faced with a variety of difficulties. Even with our best preparation our time at a particular location may be limited, we can encounter poor conditions or bad light. Our unfamiliarity with the best places to shoot often leaves us with mediocre images. The best way to overcome these problems is to be prepared and return to an area over and over again but exotic

locations can be expensive.

An alternative is to become an area expert right here in the Lowcountry. We have a diverse environment which includes marshes, rivers, beaches and wildlife as well as nearby picturesque cities and towns. By going back to a location multiple times we begin to acquire knowledge, often by trial and error, which will pay off in the long run. This knowledge will help us be better prepared to choose the location and cherry-pick the conditions that will give us the best shots. If



you enjoy a certain location return there often at different times of year and you will inevitably encounter a variety of weather conditions, unique lighting or events that will allow you to take that special photo. Consider night photography, rain and fog. Brave the cold and get that shot that no one else has.

Old Sheldon Church Field Trip

Late in the afternoon On December 16, ten club members brought their cameras, tripods and flashlights to ruins of the Old Sheldon Church. The purpose was to photograph the ruins in golden light, twilight and dark. The ruins lie amongst majestic oaks and scattered graves. Our guides, Rich Matheny and Tom Hanley, led the beginners through the proper camera settings and demonstrated how to paint the building with 1000 Lumen flashlights. The variety of image results was very good and showed a much different face of Old Sheldon. This group activity provided an excellent opportunity for socializing and getting acquainted while shooting.

This beautiful church was built in 1745 as the church of Prince William Parish. It was burned by the British in May 1779. Rebuilt then it was burned again on January 14, 1865 by troops of General Oliver O. Howard commanding Sherman's right wing coming out of Beaufort. The walls remain today and it is a spectacular place to visit. It truly is stepping back into the history books.

Ron was the former director and curator of the Reading Public Museum in Reading, Pennsylvania and the Nebraska Museum of Art of at the University of Nebraska where he curated numerous exhibitions. More recently as an independent curator and consultant he curated and scripted the permanent exhibition area of the Central Pennsylvania African American Museum. Currently he is a program administrator for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute of the University of South Carolina Beaufort. His recent photographic work was recognized with a second place prize in an exhibition held by the Society of Bluffton Artists in Bluffton, South Carolina, and was included in the Bienniale Invitational Art Exhibition of the Hilton Head Art League. An exhibition of his photography was mounted by the Bemis Center for Contemporary Art in Omaha, Nebraska.

Art Wolfe (born 1951) is an American photographer and conservationist, best known for color images of wildlife, landscapes and native cultures. His photographs document scenes from every continent and hundreds of locations, and have been noted by environmental advocacy groups for their "stunning" visual impact. Wolfe's career has been described as "multifaceted", involving wildlife advocacy, art, journalism, and education. According to William Conway, former president of the Wildlife Conservation Society, Wolfe is a "prolific and sensitive recorder of a rapidly vanishing natural world." In the last 30 years, the public has viewed Wolfe's work in more than sixty published books, including Vanishing Act, The High Himalaya, Water: Worlds between Heaven & Earth, Tribes,
