President's Message

Do you know what is in your toolbox?

Today's digital cameras, even relatively inexpensive point and shoots, are equipped with a myriad of functions that can help you make a better photo. However, using these function requires getting the information and practicing. The first and most important thing you need to do is read your users manual. These are generally real snoozers but ideal if you have insomnia. Beyond the traditional SLR settings (ISO, aperture, shutter speed) the new

functions can enhance your photos regardless of how you post process. First, learn to use your histogram; it is a better indicator of exposure than your LCD screen. Use noise reduction in low light where long exposures or high ISO equivalents may cause unwanted noise. Live view can help with focusing on stationary objects in situations when auto focus is problematic. Try using the white balance presets such as Cloudy, Shade or Tungsten rather



than automatic white balance when the situation calls for it. In some cases, such as close ups, point focus will provide a better image than focus averaging. Adjust your camera focus and recompose as necessary. Many cameras have style settings that can be set for neutral (default), landscape, vivid or portrait, which may enhance the final image. Automatic bracketing and in camera HDR may save an image where exposure is difficult. Depending on the model of your camera you may have these and many other functions, some useful and some not. Don't let your tools go to waste explore them and use those that will help you photography.



The Photographer's Corner: Clyde Butcher

Clyde Butcher (born 1941) is an American photographer known for wilderness photography of the Florida landscape. He attended California Polytechnic University in 1960 with a major in architecture. He began his career doing color photography before switching to large-scale black-and-white landscape photography after the death of his son.

Paul Schatz

Paul grew up in the Hudson Valley of New York State. That region with four distinct seasons as well as trips to the Pennsylvania Dutch country, the Catskill Mountains, Vermont and the Massachusetts shore gave him is love of landscapes. He attended the State University of New York at Plattsburgh and majored in Geology with minors in Chemistry and Photography. His desire to see more of the world drove him out west where he spent the next 16 years in the Sierra Nevada Mountains and the Lake Tahoe Basin. In addition to making a living as a Craps dealer, he spent his time photographing the natural landscape, skiing, mountain biking and hiking.
