President's Message

The Value of Critique

Recently while I was packing up some books and came across a copy of *The Photographic Eye: Learning to see with a Camera* by Michael O'Brien and Norman Sibley published in 1988 by Davis Publications, Inc. Worcester, Mass. While thumbing through a few chapters I came across their comments on critiquing and I thought they were worth sharing.

"Before you begin doing something, it is generally helpful if you establish some goals...

The best way to start setting your own photographic goals is to critique the work of other photographers. Once you begin producing your own photographs, you'll progress more rapidly if you let others critique your work as well. When a photograph is critiqued, all the various elements of it – good, bad or indifferent – are evaluated. Critiquing is not the same as criticizing, which only involves pointing out flaws. In a true critique, positive, negative comments are balanced. This s an essential skill that every photographer must develop."

While many aspects of photography have changed since this book was written this summary regarding the value of critiquing is as true today as it was in 1988. Developing expertise in any field can be challenging but it can be made easier if we take advantage of the opportunities we are given. The true value of participating in competitions is allowing yourself to develop a critical eye, gaining experience, taking advantage of the critiques and learning to evaluate you own work.

The Photographer's Corner Cotton Coulson (1952 – 2015)

Cotton started taking photographs for *National Geographic* magazine right after graduating from New York University Film School in 1975. He was hired as a contract photographer in 1976, and published over a dozen assignments for the magazine until 1987. Some of his cover titles included stories about Ireland, Berlin, and the Brendan Voyage. He won numerous prizes from the NPPA and White House Press Photographers Association.

At that time, he became associate director of photography at *U.S. News & World Report*. After several years he moved to the *Baltimore Sun*, where he was the director of photography.

In the mid-1990s Cotton decided to join the Internet revolution and moved to San Francisco, along with his wife, Sisse Brimberg, and their two children, Calder and Saskia. There he became the senior vice-president of CNET, in charge of Product Development. After ten years, he and Sisse moved to Paris and then on to Denmark, Sisse birthplace.
